A Message from Sheriff Peter J. Kusminsky

I remain honored and humbled to serve, representing the people of Greene County as your Sheriff. The Office of the Sheriff of Greene County is mandated by the New York State Constitution. As the county's only elected law enforcement officer, the Sheriff of Greene County answers directly to the people. The primary goal of the Sheriff is to assure public safety to the citizens and visitors of Greene County. I continue to be dedicated to providing professional, courteous services to the public.

This past year has been more demanding than ever. The types of cases we have been handling have become more complicated and the number of arrests we have made have dramatically increased. I am very proud of the way my deputies and corrections officers perform their jobs. They are truly dedicated public servants. Our Threat assessment Team, County Wide Senior Citizens' Call In Program, Impacted Citizens' Program, and our Community Wellness Program remain very active and have expanded to include more community stakeholders. The relationships we have forged continue to strengthen our ability to serve our residents.

This past year we acquired a more modern Armored Vehicle at no expense to the taxpayers, added an explosives detection K-9, dedicated more experienced personnel to combat drug sales and upgraded our body camera and car camera systems. My deputies continue to be actively involved in the DEA Task Force and the U.S. Marshall's Task Force, regularly pursuing and charging the drug dealers and criminals who prey upon our citizens. Lastly, we have expanded our community engagement with more Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) and Active Attack Integrated Response (AAIR) trainings and drills to be better prepared in the event of a potential active shooter incident.

I remain committed to continuing to adapt to the ever-changing demands on law enforcement. We will continue to work together with all of the other agencies within the county, including the District Attorney's Office, Greene County Emergency Services, Probation, Fire Departments, EMS agencies, State and Local Police. These partnerships enable all of us to more efficiently serve our county.

In closing, I would like to thank my Deputies, Corrections Officers, Support Staff, the Greene County Legislature, and the people of Greene County for their continued support.

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CIVIL DIVISION

The Greene County Sheriff's Office Division is responsible for the enforcement of all civil processes in Greene County which includes Summons, Orders to Show Cause, Temporary Orders of Protection, Evictions, Subpoenas, Income Executions, Property Executions, Sheriff Sales, just to name a few.

The Civil Office also undertakes a large majority of our business functions including financial transactions such as cash receipts, cash disbursements and accounts payable. The Civil Division consists of two Civil Coordinators, a Civil Manager and a part-time Civil Deputy. A total of 2,272 papers were received for service in 2025. The Civil Deputy completed 817 services with 532 attempts for a total of 1,349. Most of the papers served are done by our part-time Civil Deputy, the Road Patrol does assist in serving the immediate need papers such as Orders of Protections, immediate service for Family Court or other services including for the County Attorney. The Temporary Order of Protections can be served 7 days a week 24 hours a day, guns can be confiscated at that time if there is an order from the court instructing us to do so. The Road Patrol deputies have completed 260 services with 361 attempts for a total of 621, these numbers will be duplicated in their reports.

The Civil Division processed 1,984 papers for service in 2024 and 21,18 in 2023. In 2024, out of 1,984 papers for service there were 1,772 attempted service, 1,030 were completed and 742 were attempted numerous times with the outcome of being unable to locate, in Greene County or canceled by the attorney or court. In 2023, out of the 2118 papers for service there were 1434 attempted service, 1128 were completed and 306 were attempted numerous times with the outcome of being unable to locate in Greene County or canceled by the attorney or court.

The Courts in Greene County and the surrounding counties depend on our office and Deputies to handle matters that are received from Supreme, Surrogate, County, Family, Town and Village Courts along with attorneys.

Papers such as Family Court papers can consist of a notice to appear, summons, and/or order to show cause, petition, verification, order appointed attorney for child, custody, support or visitation petitions or orders, and could include temporary order of protection. Sometimes this paperwork can consist of 15, 20 or 30 pages. Temporary Order of Protection paperwork arrives in our office throughout the day up until 5:00 pm. These orders are immediately put out with the Road Patrol Deputies that evening to be served after our office has input all information into the Civil Serve system.

Other papers received from the county attorney for a quick turnaround time can be orders to show cause pursuant to mental hygiene law 9.60, affirmations, petitions, and medical worksheets, to name a few to review before they are input into the system and handed off for service by a deputy.

Income Executions, Bank Levies, Property Executions and Sheriff Sales are multi-step procedures and services. Some executions are monitored for years and need numerous follow ups until they are satisfied. Property Executions and Sheriff Sales are particularly time-sensitive and resource intensive to make sure all documents are accurate and handled in a timely manner.

Warrants of Eviction take numerous steps by the landlord and Civil Office with service by the deputies to complete. The Eviction Lockout is the final step and is what many consider the most dangerous step of this process to our deputies safety before the papers are sent back to the court as satisfied.

Regardless of the type of papers we may process, all papers must be reviewed upon receiving and continually monitored, mailings done and returned to the courts and/or attorneys in a legal and prompt time.

The Civil Division received a total of \$613,249.06 in receipts for 2025, compared to a total of \$679,039.12 in 2024. Poundage fees for executions in 2025 were \$26,156.52, mileage fees of \$13,552.65, processing fees for executions totaled \$22,778.69. Where in 2024 Poundage fees for executions were \$29,995.62, mileage fees of \$14,053.86, processing fees for executions totaled \$19,599.62. While all stages of evictions came to \$17,920.00 collected on fees. While all evictions stages came to \$18,427.41 collected on fees. Please note that the figures from 2024 and 2023 include monies received from Sheriff Sales, we did not have a Sheriff Sale in 2025. All fees and poundage are disbursed to the Greene County Treasurer monthly, after the reconciliation of the bank accounts and accounts payable disbursements or refunds.

Definitions of Papers for Service

Family Court – Can include Summons, Petitions, Verification, Notice of Hearing, Order to Show Cause, Financial Disclosure Affidavit, Order Appointed Attorney for the Child and possibly a Temporary Order of Protection.

Executions – Types of executions for service are Bank Levy, Income Execution – 1st stage and 2nd stage, Property Execution, and Sheriff Sale.

Warrant of Eviction - Can start with a Notice, followed by a Notice of Petition and Petition. The Warrant of Eviction is a two-step process of serving the warrant then finishing with the Eviction Lockout to secure the property.

Divorce – There are numerous combinations of papers depending on what is needed by the attorney or individual. The Civil Division requests that the papers are in order just as they want them to be served to make sure all are listed for service.

Notice of Entry/Notice to Show Cause from the County Attorney – This paperwork has several stages with numerous pages that all need to be logged in and noted on the affidavit after service.

Other papers processed with the Civil Division are Subpoenas, Citations and other miscellaneous papers from in or out of Greene County or New York state that have their own configuration, and that need to be reviewed and documented in the Civil program.

ROAD PATROL



The Road Patrol Division serves the residents of Greene County. The Deputies patrol within the local municipalities as the citizens attend school, work, and shop in the county. In an effort to further serve the residents of Greene County, the Deputies supplement police services to the Villages and Towns that provide a local police force and answer calls for service in those jurisdictions in addition to providing police services to localities that have no local law enforcement agency, whenever the need arises. The Patrol Division is responsible for enforcing the laws of the State of New York while patrolling 192 miles of state highways, 262 miles of county roads, and 719 miles of local municipality roads on a twenty-four hour, seven day a week basis. They are also responsible for patrolling the Hudson River and other waterways throughout the county as well.

The Road patrol consists of the following staff that work out of six different locations.

1 Lieutenant

3 Part-Time Lieutenants

7 Sergeants

5 Investigators

4 Part -Time Investigators

29 Full time Deputy Sheriffs

13 Per Diem Deputy Sheriffs

The Coxsackie Main Office houses our Administration along with Pistol Permits. There are (4) deputies assigned to work out of this office. The deputies of the road patrol handle the incidents/complaints of Greene county citizens by working rotating 12 hour shifts, twenty four hours a day, seven days a week.

The Ashland Satellite was opened in 2012. The Prattsville Satellite was in the direct path of the flood waters of Hurricane Irene and was flooded with several feet of water and mud. Through the support of the residents in Ashland, we opened a new satellite located at the Ashland town building to continue our service to the mountain top residents. It remains staffed by (4) deputies working a rotating 12 hour shift, twenty four hours a day, seven days a week.

The Prattsville Satellite has been re-opened in it's original location at the Prattsville Town Hall. This location serves as a processing area for patrols.

The Greenville Satellite continues to primarily service the Towns of Greenville and Durham and is located in the Greenville Town Hall. Our K-9 handlers generally report out of this Satellite to be more centrally located to the public in both the valley and mountain top areas.

The Civil Division is located within the County Clerk's office at 411 Main St. Suite 202 in Catskill.

ARRESTS 2025

The patrol division made a total of 746 arrests in 2025 resulting in 96 Felony counts, 629 Misdemeanor counts, 39 Violation counts, and 230 Mental Health arrests. In 2024 there were 551 arrests resulting in 68 Felonies, 392 Misdemeanors, 30 Violations, and 170 Mental Health arrests.

The patrol division handled 14,602 calls for service in 2025 and 12,491 in 2024. The Sheriff's Office responded to approximately **59%** of the 22,256 police 911 related calls received in the county through Greene County Emergency Operations Center in 2025 and **55%** of the 18,385 county calls in 2024. The remaining **41%** of calls in 2025 were answered by Local Police Agencies, Environmental Conservation Police or the NY State Police. A small percentage were cellular 911 calls received for incidents occurring in adjoining counties. A call for service includes any activity a deputy does while on patrol, including assists to other agencies.

CORRECTIONS DIVISION

The construction of the new Sheriff's complex and jail has reached completion and began housing inmates in September 2021. Currently Greene County's female inmates are being boarded out to Columbia and Ulster county jails.

STAFFING LEVELS:

The Greene county correction division budgeted to staff 1 Superintendent, 1 Lieutenant, 5 Sergeants and 32 correction officers. Currently 25 Correction Officer items are filled.

GOV.PAY NET:

This was utilized 15 times in 2025 for \$28,750.00 in bail money received.

BOARDING OF INMATES:

The cost of boarding in 2025 was \$130,650 to Ulster County. The cost of boarding in 2024 was \$116,550 to Ulster county. An average of 7 inmates were boarded out per day.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Greene County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Unit (CIU) currently has (5) Full-time Investigators and (4) part-time Investigators. The assigned investigators adopt cases that often require additional investigative steps and more attention to close. The unit is primarily responsible to assist patrol and investigate all major crimes, Class D- Felony and higher offenses, Sex Offender Management, warrant execution, drug investigations and employee background investigations for all county employees. The Criminal Investigations Unit regularly tracks Sex Offenders in Greene County ensuring that they are properly registered with New York State Department of Criminal Justice Services. CIU enforces the mandatory annual verification process by actively tracking and monitoring offenders, which gives Law Enforcement the most up to date information on each Sex Offender's location within Greene County. CIU actively investigates all misdemeanor and felony warrants for the Greene County Sheriff's Office.

Notable Cases from 2025

PITT Case

In November 2025, the Greene County Sheriff's Office led one of its most significant investigations of the year after a reported missing person case in the Town of Cairo developed into a homicide investigation. After inconsistencies emerged in the initial information provided to law enforcement, the Sheriff's Office assumed control of the case, executed multiple search warrants, and recovered the remains of 69-year-old Roger Pitt on his property. The investigation resulted in the arrest of Rodney Pitt, Drew White, and Tania Pitt on charges including murder, conspiracy, tampering with physical evidence, and concealment of a human corpse.

As the case progressed, a grand jury indictment alleged that Roger Pitt had been lured to a residence, restrained, killed, and then concealed through efforts that included burying the body, cleaning the scene, destroying identifying documents, and arranging for the disposal of his vehicle. The case underscored the persistence and professionalism of the Greene County Sheriff's Office and reflected the close coordination required among the Sheriff's Office, Cairo Police Department, New York State Police, and the Greene County District Attorney's Office in pursuing justice in a complex and deeply serious investigation. Case is still pending prosecution.

Coxsackie School Threat

In October 2025, the Greene County Sheriff's Office assisted in the investigation of a social media post that prompted the postponement of a scheduled Coxsackie-Athens football game. Following the report, law enforcement agencies worked with school officials to investigate the source and credibility of the post, which caused significant concern for students, families, and the broader school community. The investigation involved complex digital forensic analysis which was able to determine that the post originated from a Coxsackie-Athens student and, through in person interviews found that there was no actual threat, confirming there was neither intent nor means to carry out what had been posted.

Although the matter was ultimately determined not to present a real danger, the incident underscored the seriousness with which threats or perceived threats to school safety must be treated. The case reflected the Greene County Sheriff's Office's continued commitment to responding promptly to community concerns, working collaboratively with school administrators and partner agencies, and helping ensure the safety and security of students, staff, and spectators at school events.

Christomalis Animal Abuse

In December 2025, the Greene County Sheriff's Office led a significant animal cruelty investigation in the Town of Athens after concerns were raised regarding the health and welfare of animals being kept at a property on Lime Kiln Road. On December 9, 2025, the Sheriff's Office, working in partnership with the Columbia-Greene Humane Society, executed a search and seizure warrant at the location as the result of a joint investigation. With the assistance of the Mohawk-Hudson Humane Society, the New York State Humane Association, and Dr. Jerry Bilinski, The Greene County Sheriff's Office with assistance of the NYS Humane Society removed approximately 18 dogs, 6 cows, 12 goats, several cats, and dozens of fowl from what were described as deplorable conditions.

The investigation resulted in criminal charges against the property owner, George Chrisomalis, for numerous violations of Agriculture and Markets Article 26, Section 353, relating to cruelty to animals, and appearance tickets were issued returnable to the Town of Athens Court at a later date. The case underscored the Greene County Sheriff's Office's commitment to protecting vulnerable animals and reflected the close coordination required among law enforcement, humane organizations, and veterinary professionals to investigate neglect allegations thoroughly and ensure animals were removed from unsafe living conditions. Case is still pending prosecution.

Aided Murder Suicide

In December 2025, the Greene County Sheriff's Office assisted in a significant and highly sensitive death investigation in the Town of Catskill after receiving a 911 call from a 22-year-old Catskill man reporting that he had killed two friends at a property on Forest View Drive. Sheriff's Office investigators responded to the scene in support of the New York State Police and assisted in locating the caller, deploying a UAV drone during the search. Investigators subsequently located the caller, identified as Connor Provo, deceased from an apparent self-inflicted shotgun wound inside a camper on the property.

As the investigation continued, members of the New York State Police and Greene County Sheriff's Office searched multiple buildings on the property and located two additional deceased victims, identified as Clifford Beauchard, 34, and Justin Acevedo, 19, both of Catskill, who had sustained apparent gunshot wounds. This incident was found to be an apparent murder-suicide. The case reflected the Greene County Sheriff's Office's ability to respond rapidly to a high-risk and evolving situation, utilize specialized resources in support of partner agencies, and assist in a complex investigation requiring coordinated action with the New York State Police, Town of Cairo Police Department, and New York State Forest Rangers.

GREENE COUNTY FIRE INVESTIGATION TEAM (GCFIT)

The Fire Investigation team is comprised of volunteers from fire departments throughout the County as well as investigators from the New York State Police and the Greene County Sheriff's Office. Currently the team has a total of (4) GCSO personnel assigned, (1) New York State Police investigator, (8) volunteer firefighters, and (1) volunteer administrative aid. The team received a total of 10 call outs for fire investigations, which included 1 fatal fire investigation and 2 arsons.

Interesting cases – 2025

(#1) On the evening of 02/23/2025, The GCFIT members were requested by the Catskill Fire Department to assist with a Cause and Origin determination at a two-story multi-apartment building fatal fire at 477 Main Street in the Village of Catskill. GCFIT members were also assisted by NYS Office of Fire Prevention and Control (NYS OFPC). Investigation determined that due to the collapse hazards in the area of fire origin, the assistance of the NYS OFPC Urban Tactical Rescue (NYS OFPC UTR) Team would be needed to assist with shoring of the collapse zone to protect members during the C&O determination.

On 02/24/2025, GCSO & GCFIT members met with NYS OFPC Fire Investigators and NYS OFPC UTR Team members, where an extensive process was undertaken to shore up the collapsing first floor of the structure, to allow for the C&O determination to be conducted. GCSO/GCFIT members and NYS OFPC Fire Investigators were able to pin-point the area of fire origin as the rear bedroom of the basement apartment and determined the fire had started as a result of improper use or disposal of smoking related materials by the owner/victim.

(#2) On 06/22/2025, GCFIT members were requested by the West Athens Fire Department to assist with a Cause and Origin determination at a residential structure located at 231 High Hill Rd in the Town of Athens. Interviews of both occupants by NYSP and GCSO/GCFIT members resulted in stories which were contradicting each other and not matching the initial scene observations. GCSO/GCFIT members conducted a scene investigation, where it was determined the fire had started in the area of a garbage can and shoes, located at the bottom of the basement stairs. GCSO/GCFIT members were able to determine the fire started as result of an external heat source being applied to a burnable material in the plastic garbage can. GCSO/GCFIT investigation revealed that the fire was not accidental and that it was intentionally started. As a result of the finding of GCSO/GCFIT members, the NYSP arrested the brother for Arson for intentionally starting the fire.

(#3) On 10/17/2025, GCSO/GCFIT members were requested to respond to assist with a Cause and Origin determination, regarding a fire being handled by the Cairo Fire Department at 430 Mountain Ave (Cr-24) Purling NY.

GCSO/GCFIT members responded and were briefed by Cairo Fire Department Chief who had observed a heavy fire condition in the first-floor apartment on the left front corner of the building, with fire exiting the rear bedroom window. GCSO/GCFIT members observed that the fire damage was greatest in the first floor, left apartment and that fire damage lessened as you moved away from this apartment area. GCSO/GCFIT members conducted a detailed examination of the apartment and located the area of origin as being the rear bedroom of this apartment. Upon closer examination of the bedroom, GCSO/GCFIT members located the remnants of a candle in the point of origin, which was determined to have been on the corner of the bed, where it was tucked into the corner of the bedroom.

GCSO/GCFIT members conducted interviews of the owner of the structure who stated the tenant's son had made numerous threats in the past about burning the building down. GCSO/GCFIT members determined the fire started as result of the candle being intentionally placed or left on the corner of the bed, in the bedding materials, which caught fire and spread to the entire bed, mattress and adjoining walls, then ultimately to the other parts of the apartment and structure.

GCSO/GCFIT members advised NYSP Investigators of the results of the Cause and Origin determination and the NYSP arrested a subject for Arson for recklessly starting the fire based on the GCFIT findings.



MARINE PATROL

For the 2025 season, the Greene County Sheriff's Office logged approximately 350 enforcement hours on the river. During this time, deputies supported the Catskill School District at several events, including the annual Spring Rush, as well as boating and fishing education classes.

Marine patrol units provided safety and security coverage for multiple community events, including the Catskill Country Concert, numerous fireworks displays, and fair-related activities along the riverside.

Deputies also assisted Albany County agencies with safety and security patrols for the annual Horse Power on the Hudson event. In addition, the Sheriff's Office provided marine security for the first annual jet ski races in Coxsackie, and conducted safety patrols during the YMCA Triathlon at Sleepy Hollow Lake. Throughout the season, deputies conducted regular security checks of critical Greene County infrastructure, investigated and reported on boating accidents, aided with towing of disabled vessels, and performed routine safety stops to address impaired or inexperienced boating operators, helping ensure safe and enjoyable boating activities for all river users.

The Greene County Sheriff's Office is also expected to take delivery of a new patrol boat in early 2026, which will further enhance marine patrol and public safety capabilities.

DIVE TEAM

This year the Greene County Dive team continued to train with the Ulster County Dive Team and various other agencies. The Team trains for underwater dive calls and also swift water rescue calls. This year we also purchased a new swift water rescue sled.

During the winter months, the team worked on improving our response to ice rescues and readiness with different training scenarios including surface, ice shelf searches, and ice diving.

In May 2025 the dive team also assisted in the filming of a major motion picture in Catskill.

We continue to actively pursue all grants that would increase the productivity of our Office without the added burden to our county taxpayers.

SHERIFF'S K-9 UNIT

For 2025 there were 57 reportable K9 incidents.

Bolt, Haas and Rip had a combined 54 deployments for 36 vehicle searches, 8 tracks, 1 warrant assist for probation, 8 explosive searches and 1 jail search.

There were 3 reportable incidents for reduction of escalation from the Cairo Elementary Therapy Dog K9 Mac, where he was used to successfully diffuse out of control student situations, which allowed them to return to their classrooms for the remainder of the day.

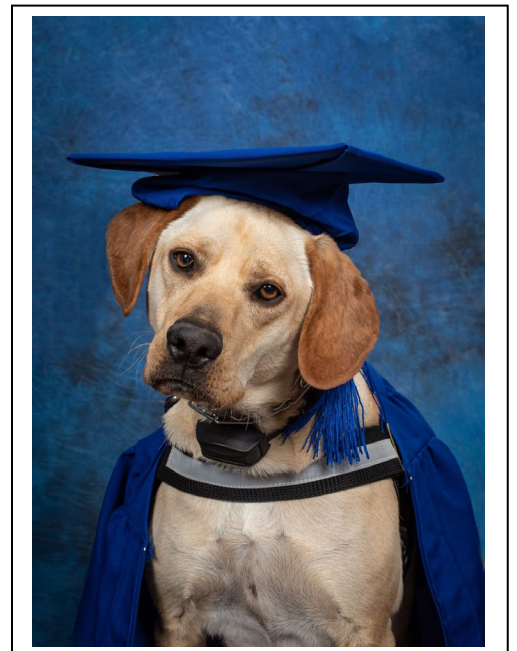

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES & COUNTY OFFICE BUILDING SECURITY DETAIL

Since it's opening, the Sheriff's Office has been providing security and services to the employees and customers of the County Office Building and the Department of Social Services. We currently have 1 Full-time or 1 Part-time deputy assigned to DSS and the County Office Building (COB) and continue the successful use of several Special Patrol Officers.

The Special Patrol Officers' primary duty is to oversee entry into the building and passage through the Magnetometers. In order to be considered for this position the applicant must be either a retired Police or Peace officer. This requirement ensures our agency that the SPO's are knowledgeable with NYS Laws and have experience dealing with the public. We currently utilize (5) SPO's who work on a rotating schedule on a part – time basis.

The magnetometers have been very helpful in preventing potential weapons from being brought into the building, including firearms and edged weapons.

Between the Department of Social Services and the County office building, there were a total of 167 calls for service in 2025 and 151 in 2024. Among these calls for service were lost license plate reports for DMV, employee business related injuries, training, file checks, meetings, etc. These calls include but are not limited to:

MENTAL HEALTH SECURITY DETAIL

For over the past 16 years, the Sheriff's Office has been providing a Deputy to the County Office of Mental Health to provide security for their workers at the Cairo Office Building Annex. In 2013, the Sheriff's Office began assigning (2) part-time Deputies/SPO's during Mental Health business hours. Also, a magnetometer was installed to provide additional safety to the Office of Mental Health. The members' primary duties are to ensure the safety of the mental health employees and patients. They also assist the road patrol with the detention of patients who are being ordered to be transported to mental health treatment facilities. They work varying daytime hours Monday through Friday, including some late-night hours.

SENIOR CALL-IN PROGRAM

In early 2020, the GCSO saw a need for and implemented the Senior Call-In Program for Greene County's senior citizens to help ensure their safety and wellbeing. This program is administered by the Corrections division and assists seniors daily by making sure they are in good health. Members of the program are instructed to call in daily between the hours of 7:00 – 10:00 AM and advise the officer who receives the call they are OK. If a call is not received by the enrolled senior by 10:15AM, GCSO will call the senior; call friends/relatives of the senior; and lastly dispatch a patrol unit to the senior's home. Although not required, participants are also encouraged to provide major medical precautionary information which may assist GSCO staff in times of need. If participants will not be participating for vacation, hospitalization, etc., GSCO requests to be notified of the dates to not expect a call-in.

March 2025, marks the three-year anniversary of this program that now assists 15 senior residents. It is comforting to know that the Sheriff's office can provide this valuable service to our elderly population to ensure their safety and wellness as well as thank them for their contributions to Greene County over the years.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

We currently have (8) Deputies assigned to the SRO Program in (7) school districts. Deputy JoAnne Rivera is assigned to the Cairo-Durham Middle and High School, Deputy Steven Espel is assigned to the Cairo-Durham Elementary School, Deputy Dustin Rogers is assigned to the Greenville School District, Deputy Cody Rogers is assigned to the Windham-Ashland-Jewett School District, Deputy Marino Romito is assigned to the Hunter – Tannersville Central School District, Deputy Cole Matthews is assigned to the Marilyn Noonan School at Durham, Deputy Corey Clark is assigned to the Cocksackie-Athens School District and Deputy Will Wyant is assigned to Catskill School District. We have quarterly meetings with both the SROs and the schools to assess the program and make changes when necessary. This program is funded primarily by the participating school districts. Overall, the program is a success and we are excited to see it grow and our county's children benefit from having a good relationship with our Deputies!

DRONES

In 2025, the Drone Unit was deployed to assist with numerous incidents throughout the county. These deployments included aiding in the search for missing or lost individuals, locating a deceased suspect involved in a double homicide investigation, assisting with narcotics sales investigations, and supporting other county agencies with infrastructure inspections and security checks of protests and other gatherings.

IMPACTED CITIZENS PROGRAM (ICP)

In response to health concerns due to the use of drugs and the resulting overdoses within our country, state and particularly our own Greene County, the Greene County Sheriff's Office has taken an active role in providing help to members of our community.

With coordination and cooperation from the Columbia-Greene Addiction Coalition, Mental Health Association Columbia Greene Counties (MHACG), Greene County Mental Health and all community providers, we are entering the sixth year of the program called "Impacted Citizens Program" (ICP).

The goal of the program is for members of the Sheriff's Office, if appropriate, to respond to reported overdoses within 24 to 72 hours after being notified of a substance overdose or mental health concern. Members of the team assist the individual by providing information, connecting to a peer and educating on resources for recovery, mental health and other programs that address the current or circumstantial difficulties. Should the individual not wish to receive any services at the time, they are provided with the contact information of a team member for future outreach. Team members follow up to assess future needs or progress. The Team also offers leave behind Narcan and Fentanyl Test Strips.

Studies have shown that individuals who have one or more overdoses may not be the only one in need of support. Support services are also available to family members and others associated with the individual.

The ICP program has evolved into more than just responding to reported overdoses. The team assists with any need brought to our attention where our assistance would be appropriate. These needs may be things such as assisting individuals who have had housing difficulties, difficulties due to the loss of driving privileges, domestic violence, teens with problems in school, etc. The team helps make connections with the proper resources to get the individual the assistance required to lead a productive life.

For 2025 the ICP team evaluated daily reports and deemed that 109 cases met the requirement for the team to respond. 18 of those individuals were residents of other counties or could not be located. 8 stated they had a different type of medical emergency and did not require assistance. 20 declined services and were provided information should they require future assistance. Of those remaining, 63 engaged in reviewing services through our contacts and referral sources.

The program also helped numerous community members who outreached the office due to concerns with mental health, dementia, and uncertainty on how to seek follow up services.

Other components to the program include training to law enforcement personnel and other first responders on the complexity of the issues and the understanding of how we can best deal with the overdose epidemic. This year, with funding from the ICP grant, a full week of Crisis Intervention Training was provided to select officers and then further 4 hour Trauma Informed Care trainings were held for

additional officers. These trainings enhance officers' ability to help individuals with addiction and mental health issues.

LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTED DIVERSION PROGRAM (LEAD)

The Sheriff's Office has also initiated the Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) program. LEAD, a national program, uses pre-arrest police diversion and community-based, trauma-informed care systems, and harm reduction, with the goals of improving public safety, public order, and reducing law violations by people who participate in the program. This program has helped community members connect to resources including mental health and case management. The current LEAD participants continue to be open and supported by the program. After assessment it was determined that many of the individuals referred better met the criteria for ICP and were followed up with substance and mental health support.

COMMUNITY WELLNESS PROGRAM

This past year, in association with the NY Sheriff's Association, the GCSO participated in the successful launch of the Blue Envelope Program. The program is a free public service providing a blue envelope to drivers with autism. Drivers with autism can keep in the envelope their license, registration, insurance card or other relevant documents, which a police officer would normally request upon a traffic stop. In this way, when the police officer sees the blue envelope during a traffic stop, the officer is immediately alerted to the driver's autism and can adjust his or her own actions and reactions to fit that situation. The envelopes were given out at tabling events in the community and at Columbia Greene College.

Additionally, we continue to offer an officer wellness program that provides officers with the support of a social worker to utilize in coping with the stress of working in law enforcement.

In support of community outreach multiple public events were attended from the Windham Autumn Affair to local community days, National Night out and the Greene County Youth Fair.

TRAINING

The 2025 in-service training program delivered a structured curriculum totaling **41** hours per sworn member, ensuring compliance with New York State requirements while enhancing operational readiness and professional development.

In Service #1:

Child Abuse Investigations – 4 hours

This training provided deputies with the knowledge and skills necessary to recognize signs of physical, emotional, and sexual abuse. Instruction emphasized mandated reporting requirements, coordination with Child Protective Services, proper documentation, and conducting trauma-informed interviews with child victims.

In Service #2:

Criminal Investigative Techniques – 4 hours

Deputies received instruction on modern investigative strategies, including case development, suspect identification, interview strategies, and evidence analysis. The training reinforced critical thinking, report writing, and the use of intelligence-led policing techniques to support successful case outcomes.

In Service #3:

Evidence Collection, Preservation & Crime Scene Photography – 4 hours

This block focused on proper crime scene management, including securing scenes, identifying and collecting evidence, and maintaining chain of custody. Deputies were trained in effective crime scene photography techniques to accurately document evidence and scene conditions for investigative and prosecutorial purposes.

In Service #4:

Standard Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) & DWI Arrest Processing – 5 hours

Deputies were trained and refreshed on standardized field sobriety testing procedures. Instruction included identifying indicators of impairment, proper test administration, report writing, and courtroom testimony. The training also covered chemical testing procedures and legal requirements for DWI arrests.

In Service #5:

Firearms Training (Pistol, Rifle, Shotgun, Including Low-Light Conditions) – 8 hours

This comprehensive training emphasized safe weapons handling, marksmanship, and tactical deployment of department-issued firearms. Deputies engaged in live-fire exercises under both daylight and low-light conditions, focusing on target identification, decision-making under stress, and use-of-cover principles.

Use of Force / Use of Deadly Force – 3 hours

This training reviewed constitutional standards, applicable case law, and departmental policy governing the use of force. Scenario-based discussions reinforced appropriate force decision-making, proportionality, and the duty to intervene, with emphasis on proper reporting and articulation.

In Service #6:

Defensive Tactics (Including Alternatives to Prone Detention & In-Custody Medical Care) – 6 hours

This training reinforced the principles of incident command, unified response, and interagency coordination during critical incidents and large-scale emergencies.

Policy Updates, Agency Rules & Regulations – 2 hours

Deputies were briefed on updates to departmental policies, procedures, and legal standards, ensuring consistent application and compliance with evolving laws and best practices.

In Service #7**Critical Incident Trauma & De-escalation Techniques – 4 hours**

This training emphasized recognizing trauma responses and applying effective communication strategies to safely resolve volatile encounters. Deputies practiced techniques aimed at reducing use-of-force incidents and improving outcomes during crisis situations.

In addition to in-service training, members of the Greene County Sheriff's Office participated in a wide range of specialized training programs based on assignment, rank, and operational need.

SUMMER CAMP

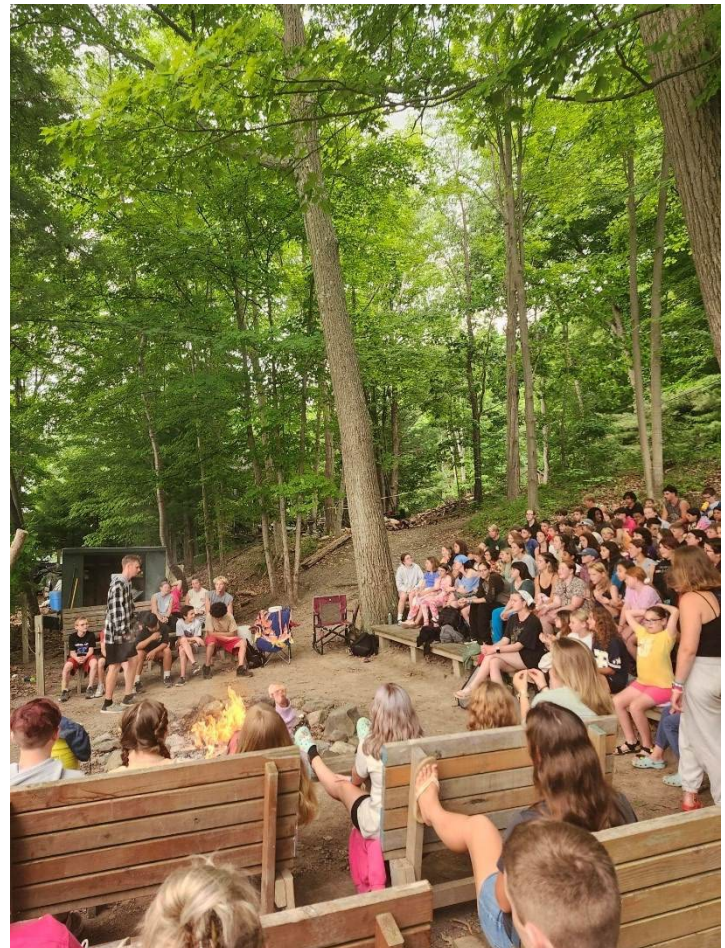
