Re: 2019 Annual Report

In 2019, Greene County Libraries circulated 323,072 items a 6.5% increase over 2018.

At an average cost of \$20 per item, this represents a savings of \$6,461,440

to library patrons/taxpayers: an increase in savings of \$392,920 over 2018.

This does <u>not</u> include the cost savings of free WiFi or of participating in free programs or having access to online databases such as the Health Reference Center and online newspapers or receiving help from a reference librarian or receiving one-on-one technology help.

Also, community rooms can be reserved, free of charge, to nonprofits and community groups. To see what your library can save you, use the Library Value Calculator found on most library websites.

Library program attendance rose from 31,206 to 33,532, a more than 7% increase over the prior year.

Library programming included following:

- Pre-literacy programs for infants and toddlers
- G.E.D. and E.S.L.
- Creative Writing and Art programs (providing employment opportunities to local artists as well as free exposure to the Arts for patrons)
- Exercise programs—Qigong, Yoga (including Chair Yoga), Aerobics for active seniors, et al, Introduction to Ballet for kids, Fall Prevention, Drum and Dance
- One on one computer instruction and assistance; Homework help
- Robotics and other S.T.E.M. programming
- Gun safety and permit training and certification
- Photography clubs, Lego clubs, Science clubs, Coloring clubs, Book clubs,
 Ukulele club, Quilt clubs, Knit and Crochet clubs, Children's Sewing club
- Museum passes including Thomas Cole, Olana, and Museum of Innovation/Science
- Movies for children, teens and adults
- Visiting authors
- Music concerts
- Space provided to health insurance navigators, Census recruiters, and tax preparation facilitators as well as nonprofit agencies and community groups.
- Collaborations with other organizations include Cornell Cooperative Extension, Greene County Council
 on the Arts, YMCA, BOCES, Summer Recreation Programs, local businesses for traveling story time programs, local schools, Columbia-Greene Community College and 23arts Initiative.

County Funding:

County funding helps to equalize library services within the county and to provide services to those county residents who are not within a chartered area. For the 2019 year, \$21,141 of total county funding was divided among the 8 libraries to help offset the costs of serving residents from Halcott, Lexington, Prattsville, Jewett, Durham and New Baltimore.

Residents of these towns have free use of the libraries but are not directly taxed for services. In 2019, the remaining county funds were used for the following services:

- \$3,800 went to technical support
- \$1,791 went towards online databases that provide access to reliable health info, business resources, job and career resources, history and genealogy, and homework help.
- \$3,200 went for eBooks and audiobooks
- \$1,999 went for tax preparation, outreach (brochures), *Book Pages* subscription, and a subscription to Hudson River Valley Heritage. Hudson River Valley Heritage consists of digital collections from libraries and cultural heritage institutions that document the rich heritage of the Hudson River Valley.
